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Franconia: Bavaria with a difference

As a crash course on Nuremberg as a media city, did you know that the inventor of Google Maps and today's navigation systems came from there? He was Martin Behaim (1459 – 1507) who constructed the terrestrial first globe, called "Erdapfel" (earth apple). And the first (self-)marketing expert was also born and died there * He was extremely industrious and could spread his works also thanks to the printshop of his godfather, publisher Anton Koberger (ca. 1440 – 1513). The composer of the first jingle spent his youth and later years in Nuremberg**.



Other important personalities from the Nuremberg region include TV manufacturer Max Grundig, the Schickedanz family, who with their mail-order company Quelle laid the ground for the Amazon affinity of Germans, or Theo Schöller who invented packed ice cream. The Bavarian public-service broadcaster BR has a studio in Nuremberg, while the commercial offer for the region (1.2 million people live in the area Nuremberg – Fuerth – Erlangen) comprises 5 local or regional TV channels and 27 local or regional radio services (VHF or DAB+). Football fans will treasure their twice-weekly "Kicker" magazine which is published in Nuremberg, as is c't, the leading computer magazine, not to mention the daily newspapers NZ and NN etc. etc. etc.

Even though Franconia has officially been part of Bavaria since 1803, Franconians still do not call themselves Bavarians to this day; they treasure their own sense of identity, as can be seen, for instance, by the state colours red and white (Bavaria has white and blue, and in this order!). One thing Franconians share with the rest of Bavaria is beer-brewing: there are around 300 breweries in Franconia. However, Franconian wine is also a speciality (it is bottled in "Bocksbeutel"). Nuremberg prides itself also for the sweet and savoury: the Nuremberg Rostbratwürstl (usually consumed three in a roll) and the Nürnberger Lebkuchen, a typical biscuit especially eaten around Christmas.

There is a direct underground line (U2) connecting the airport to the central station (Hauptbahnhof); the journey takes approx. 12 minutes. From there it is only a short walk to the NH Nürnberg City Center Hotel (approx. 5 minutes) or to the IBIS Nürnberg Hauptbahnhof Hotel (approx. 10 minutes).

Alternatively, you can take the S 1 or S 8 train from the airport to Munich central station (Hauptbahnhof); from there, there are both fast and regional trains to Nuremberg main station around every 20 minutes. It you travel at peak time, it might be advisable to reserve a seat.



Miscellanenous information

Currency

Germany is a member of the Euro zone. Payments are possible with the usual credit cards (American Express, MasterCard, Visa). Most banks have ATM machines with the CIRRUS or MAESTRO system, and also offer cash withdrawals with credit cards. Small amounts are usually paid in cash (local transport, taxis etc.).

Bank opening hours

Banks are usually open Monday – Friday 09.30 hours – 16.00 hours.

On Thursdays, some banks are open until 18.00 hours; on Saturday and Sunday banks are closed.

Money can also be changed at the airports and train stations, look for the "Change/Cambio" sign.

Shop opening hours in Nuremberg

Monday – Saturday approx. 09.30 - 20.00 hours (except for small shops which usually close around 18.00 hours)

Sunday: shops closed

Nuremberg has been linked to the era of National Socialism in Germany through the "Nuremberg Laws" which were proclaimed there and the Nazi Party rallies, but also as a result of the response of the Allied Forces who conducted the Nuremberg Trials there in 1945/46. one-day tour: Ansbach – margravial residential city (cost: € 35 - € 40 per person, depending on the number of participants)

Ansbach is the seat of the District Government of Middle Franconia and former residency of the margraves of Brandenburg-Ansbach. First mentioned in 748, it offers impressive historic buildings reflecting the glamorous past of the former residential city which also became home to foundling Kaspar Hauser, "the Child of Europe" who continues to fascinate regarding his as yet undetermined decendancy to this day.
